NEO Personality Inventory 3

Populations

- Revised for use in age 12 and above, but different norms for different age groups
 - Adolescents, college-age
- Many different language translations
- 5th grade or above reading level
- Can be given individually or in groups
- Both self (S) and other (R) rater forms

Use

- Developed to operationalize Costa and McCrae's Five-Factor Model
- Measures the five factors of personality
 - Six facets for each factor (30 total)
 - Facets can be seen as subscales for each domain (Factor)

Clinical Uses

- Understanding the client
- Help with diagnostic issues
- Empathy and rapport establishment
- Feedback and increasing insight into own behavior
- Anticipating course of therapy
- Selecting optimal treatment

Five Factor Model

- Factor I – Extraversion
- Factor II – Agreeableness
- Factor III – Conscientiousness
- Factor IV – Neuroticism
- Factor V – Openness to Experience

Facets of Extraversion

- Warmth (E1)
- Gregariousness (E2)
- Assertiveness (E3)
- Activity (E4)
- Excitement-seeking (E5)
- Positive Emotions (E6)

Facets of Agreeableness

- Trust (A1)
- Straightforwardness (A2)
- Altruism (A3)
- Compliance (A4)
- Modesty (A5)
- Tender-mindedness (A6)

Facets of Conscientiousness

- Competence (C1)
- Order (C2)
- Dutifulness (C3)
- Achievement Striving (A4)
- Self-discipline (C5)
- Deliberation (C6)

Facets of Neuroticism

- Anxiety (N1)
- Anger/Hostility (N2)
- Depression (N3)
- Self-consciousness (N4)
- Impulsiveness (N5)
- Vulnerability (N6)

Facets of Openness

- Fantasy (O1)
- Aesthetics (O2)
- Feelings (O3)
- Actions (O4)
- Ideas (O5)
- Values (O6)

Scoring

- There are computer-scoring programs, but easy to score by hand
- If 40+ missing, do not score measure
- If 3+ missing on any Facet, do not score that Facet
- Handscoring very similar to PAI

Strengths

- Strong theoretical basis
- Examines broad aspects of personality
- Both a self- and other-report version
- Wording is statement rather than rating based
- Strong reliability and validity data

Weaknesses

- Little focus on maladaptive traits
- Seems to be sensitive to group differences (better on 3rd version, but still new)
- Concern among some over the ordering of domains and facets
